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## Foreword

### **Empathy, Empowerment, and Outreach in Action**

The first quarter of FY 2025–26 has been an inspiring beginning to a landmark year for AWMH Maharashtra. As we continue celebrating over five decades of commitment to children with intellectual and developmental disabilities, I am heartened to share how our team, volunteers, and well-wishers have infused new energy into our work.

### **Strengthening Early Intervention**

Our six Early Intervention Centers across Mumbai continue to provide structured support to over 300 children. We had the privilege of representing AWMH at several significant platforms this quarter. On 15th and 24th April, We conducted sessions for 19 mid-level rehabilitation officials from the Government of Myanmar at the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai. These sessions focused on disability rights, inclusive advocacy, and legal protections under India's framework—highlighting our global role in capacity building and knowledge sharing. A special memory was the role play by participants in Burmese, demonstrating deep assimilation of the concepts.

### **Community Engagement & Grassroots Sensitization**

On 28th April, AWMH in collaboration with TISS, conducted sessions for Anganwadi workers and supervisors. It was a joy to address this dynamic audience along with Prof. Dr. Vaishali Kolhe, Dr. Shital Fulzele, and Dr. Jagruti Khade. Their resolve to act as early identifiers and supporters for children with developmental delays gives us much hope.

### **Enabling Parents through Awareness**

I, as AWMH President, addressed over 200 parents in Pimpri-Chinchwad on 21st May, speaking on the critical theme of 'Passing Their Legacy to PwIDDs.' The discussion covered guardianship, wills, and private trusts—sparking heartfelt Q&A from families new to this subject. I commend the efforts of the four NGOs and the Divyang Bhawan in organizing this impactful event.

### **Partnerships and Recognition**

On 30th April, AWMH participated in a video panel discussion hosted by WIPRO, alongside two young parents from their workforce. The program saw enthusiastic participation, meaningful stories, and concluded with Wipro's appreciation of AWMH's role in promoting early intervention. 
### **Celebrating Yoga and Sports**



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# 1. Early Intervention Centers

**AWMH, Maharashtra** is running 6(Six) Early Intervention (EI) centres across Mumbai Suburbs Like Dombivli, Mulund, Ghatkopar, Mankhurd, Khetwadi and J.J.Hospital centre. Early intervention services give **specialized support** to children and families in the early years (from birth to school entry 6 yr.). This support includes

- Special Education
- Occupational Therapy
- Speech Therapy
- Counseling to parents
- Training parents for home bound programs
- Developmental And Psychological Assessment

## a. Promoting child's development

All the programs or sessions aimed at promoting child's development. Any Intervention selected for a child is Family centric, Developmentally Appropriate, child focused, supportive and structured. The Trans-disciplinary team is characterized by the commitment of its members to teach, learn, and work together to implement coordinated services. We had 320 children registered in our 6 EI centers out of which around 225 children come regularly for availing EI services. We also train the parents for carrying our home bound program.

## b. We Welcome Our New Joinees to AWMH Family

We are pleased to welcome Dr. Jagruti Khade as our new Occupational Therapist at the Mulund center, effective from 15th April 2025. Additionally, Dr. Ashish Singh, our Speech Therapist, has joined on a part-time basis, starting from 12th April 2025, and will be working at the Khetwadi center every Saturday.

## c. EIRP Staff Meetings

## d. Session on disability subjects on 15th April 2025

On 15.04.25 Cdr. Shrirang Bijur took a half-day session on disability subjects for 19 middle level officials of Govt of Myanmar. This was arranged by International Affairs division and TISS Mumbai. The officials were from depts. of rehabilitation and Social welfare. In view of recent earthquake calamities it had become important that essential and critically required services are not denied to children with disabilities.

In the afternoon we took them to NEIPID, Navi Mumbai where the Officer in Charge Dr Ravi Prakash Singh showed the facilities in the institute and briefed about NIEPID work

#### **e. Session on Advocacy and Legal Rights on 24th April 2025**

It was a honor for Cdr. Shirang Bijur to be invited once again by the International Affairs Division to conduct a session on Advocacy and Legal Rights for 19 Rehabilitation Officers from Myanmar on 24th April 2025 at TISS, Mumbai. The session was highly participative and warmly received. A special highlight was the Role Play activity, creatively enacted by the participants in Burmese language — leading to deeper understanding, assimilation, and appreciation of the key concepts discussed

#### **f. Sessions for Anganwadi workers and supervisors on 28th April 25**

AWMH is committed to reaching parents and grassroots workers to emphasize the critical importance of Early Intervention therapeutic support for children with neurodevelopmental disabilities. In collaboration with the Tata Institute of Social Sciences (TISS), Mumbai, AWMH conducted awareness sessions for Anganwadi workers and supervisors. The response was overwhelming, participants pledged to actively refer cases of neurodevelopmental disabilities (NDD) to AWMH, and extend special attention to the well-being of affected families, and work towards eliminating discrimination against them. It was a truly rewarding workshop, featuring insightful sessions by Prof. Dr. Vaishali Kolhe (Dean, Disability Studies, TISS), Cdr. Shirang Bijur (President, AWMH Maharashtra), Dr. Shital Fulzale (Early Intervention coordinator & Occupational Therapist) and Dr Jagruti Khade, Occupational Therapist. ### **i. Support through Orthosis equipment by Rotary Club of Mumbai Charities Trust no 3**

An orthosis, also known as an orthotic device, is an externally applied medical device designed to support, align, prevent, or correct the function of a body part, especially within the musculoskeletal system. These devices play a vital role in enhancing mobility, stability, and overall function, while also protecting and supporting injured or weakened areas.

The Rotary Club of Mumbai Charities Trust No. 3 has been a longstanding supporter of AWMH, contributing to various initiatives aimed at improving patient care. Recently, the Trust sponsored orthotic devices for children at the Mankhurd center, incurring a cost of approximately Rs. 49,000/-.

### **j. Visit of 17 B.Ed. trainee teachers from SNDT University on 20th and 23rd June, 2025**

#### **i Details of the Visit**

- Dates of Visit: 20th June 2025 and 23rd June 2025
- Time: 9:45 am to 12:45 pm on both days
- Participants: 17 trainee teachers divided into two groups
- Venue: CASE and Therapy Department, J.J. Hospital Center of AWMH

The students visited in two slots, with some on 20th June and the remaining on 23rd June. The visits provided an opportunity to observe early intervention strategies and interact with professionals involved in child development.

#### **ii. Observations and Activities**

During the visits, the trainee teachers observed:

- The multidisciplinary approach involving occupational therapists and special educators working collaboratively with parents.
- Cases of children in the early stages of development, ranging from 2 weeks post-birth to 5 years old.
- Conditions such as Cerebral Palsy and Autism Spectrum Disorder.
- Focused interventions on sensory integration and developmental delays.
- The process of engaging with parents to facilitate developmental progress.
- The provision of speech therapy services at a separate centre within the hospital.



#### **iii. Trainee Testimonials**

The trainees expressed their appreciation for the experience, highlighting the following insights:

"The visit to AWMH (early intervention center) in JJ hospital was a wonderful experience where we got to see the collaboration of occupational therapist and special educator with the parents for the development of the children. We saw cases in the initial stages which were as early as 2 weeks of post-birth to age 5, from CP to Autism. The occupational therapist and special educator solved our queries and we were given permission to engage with the parents. They focused on sensory integration and development delays in the children. They also provide speech therapy to the children in a different center."

#### **iv. Conclusion**

The visit successfully provided the trainee teachers with valuable practical exposure to early intervention practices for children with learning disabilities. Observing the integrated efforts of therapists, educators, and parents underscored the importance of a collaborative approach in early childhood development. Such experiences are instrumental in preparing future educators to effectively support children with learning Disabilities

## v. Recommendations

- Continued collaboration between SNDT University and J.J. Hospital for practical training.
- Incorporation of similar visits into the B.Ed. curriculum.
- Further training sessions on sensory integration and early intervention techniques.
- Encouragement of trainee teachers to engage actively with professionals and parents during such visits

## k. Awareness & Sensitization Workshop for JJ Hospital Medical & Para Medical Professionals

The ongoing efforts to enhance awareness and sensitization among the medical and para-medical professionals at JJ Hospital is being aimed at increasing referrals of children requiring early intervention. As part of our strategy to boost footfalls of children, we had initially requested Dr. Bela Verma, HOD of Pediatrics at JJ Hospital, to facilitate referrals. To support this initiative, we planned to conduct awareness sessions and workshops within the hospital premises. We approached Dr. Verma regarding the workshop, but she informed us that there are no available slots in July due to prior commitments. However, she assured us that she will inform us of suitable dates in August to conduct the workshop for residents and other hospital staff

The key topics scheduled for discussion included:

- Neurodevelopmental Disabilities: Overview, risk factors, prevalence
- Early Intervention & Pre-schooling Support: Scope, requirements, trans-disciplinary approaches
- Autism Spectrum Disorder: Core deficits, behavioral aspects, therapeutic interventions
- Parent Counseling & Family Support
- Presentation of Success Stories

We remain committed to this initiative and will provide update on the finalized dates.

The drills include:

- Right-hand and left-hand dribbling
- Cross dribbling
- Dribbling combined with layup shots

This combination adds a layer of complexity and develops alertness and spatial awareness, as students learn to judge which part of the backboard to aim for when shooting. The students are showing excellent progress and increased confidence during these sessions.

#### ii. Carom Tournament Preparation

After the basketball, students train for the skills of Carom which will prepare them for the upcoming Carom Tournament to be held in the month of July which will be organized by V. D. Indian Society

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To enhance engagement and sportsmanship:

- We conduct friendly matches between higher-ability students.
- After each match, we rotate opponents to encourage interaction and adaptability.
- The joy and sense of achievement visible on the children's faces when they win a game is incredibly Rewarding and motivating.

### iii. Summer Vacation


Students have been given a short Summer Vacation from 17th May to 25th May 2025. Regular weekend coaching sessions will resume on Saturday, 31st May 2025.



